Registration is 8 to 9am on Sat. mornings at the Maya Club house. Tournament season is just around the corner. The first outdoor tournament of the year is the Yuba Sutter Bow Hunters tournament 2/17/13. There will be 42- 3 D animals to shoot, at ranges that vary from 7 to 93 yards. This is a great way to meet fellow archers and help support the Clubs in our region.

The Club needs to replace many, if not all, of the straw bales on the range. These new bales are even larger and heavier than the bales currently used. We could use many strong and young members on this project as it is a BIG project. We will send out an email informing all of you when we need the help.

On a closing note, Wilderness Archery is one of the sites hosting the NOR CAL INDOOR CHAMPIONSHIP. This shoot will be February 24th at Wilderness Archery Shop 4870 Pacific Street Rocklin Ca. 95677. It will be a modified Flint round with all arrows shot at 20 yards. The cost is 10 dollars for adults and 7 dollars for young adults, youth, and cub shooters. The Club with the highest number of shooters in attendance will win one year free advertising in the Nor Cal newsletter. There will be a potluck lunch immediately following the shoot. Make plans to come out and have a good time and support your Club.

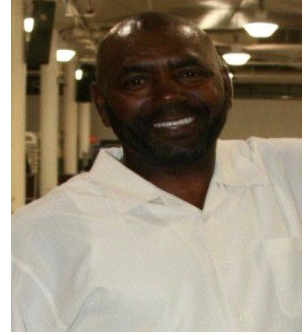

Remember when you help at the range for a set up of a shoot or event, Work Party enhancement (work day of usually 5 hrs.), help set up weekly for the leagues, become an active officer you earn credits towards your annual membership dues. Membership renewals will be mailed in June with dues to be paid by the first of July each year.

- ◆ Monthly usually the second Saturday of the month - Youth and Adult Archery Lessons through Roseville Parks and Recreation sign up with them.
- ◆ Polar Bear League (Winter January 5th starts runs 12 weeks)
- ◆ Maya Annual Banquet and Fun Night (March each year)
- ◆ Maya Around the World Open (for guests only members not allowed to shoot this event as we host it and need all the members to help out) Always the third Sunday in April It take 50-80 people to host this event.
- ◆ Broadhead League (usually starts in May thru July) Saturday mornings
- ◆ 3-D Animal League (field points only) (spring time) (usually starts in May thru July) Saturday mornings
- ◆ Club Championship (Club shoot Sunday in October)
- ◆ Annual Awesome Stick bow Classic (for guests only we need members to help out all day for this event) It takes 60 people to host this event.
- ◆ November Club Meeting (nomination of Officers) Voting at December meeting
- ◆ Annual Toys for Tots Shoot always the first Sunday in December

## Nor Cal

What is Nor Cal?

The full name for this regional group is Nor Cal Bowhunters. They represent the areas 7 archery/bowhunting clubs and 2 archery pro shops to California Bowmen Hunters State Archery Association (CBHSAA). CBHSAA and Nor Cal are chartered to the National Field Archery Association (NFAA). What does Nor Cal and CBHSAA do for Archery or Bowhunting? There are many facets to their representation of Archery and Bowhunting. CBHSAA is “Dedicated to Promoting and Protecting the Archery and Bowhunting Heritages”. This statewide organization speaks for California Archers and Bowhunters in matters concerning Legislation and Regulation since 1943. The Legislative committee of CBHSAA includes a Coordinator, 6 state area reps and each region group has one legislative representative. Archery is a shooting sport so at times issues arise to limit or exclude the shooting of Bows and Arrows for any purpose. CBHSAA will pursue those actions for the benefit of all Archers and Bowhunters. Future meeting dates, Feb. 13th and March 13th, 7pm at the Maya Clubhouse.

The annual California Bowmen Hunters State Archery Association (CBHSAA) meeting was held the last weekend of January down in Santa Anna. The CBHSAA Legislative Committee met Friday afternoon and had good discussions on past and future projects involving both Target Archery and Bowhunting. Saturday CBHSAA meeting had 3 CBHSAA petitions to modify tournament classification for Traditional and Recurve. National Field Archery Association (NFAA) petitions (30) covered a wide variety of modifications to tournament rules. The NFAA meeting in February will have the final votes on the 30 petitions.

The 2013 California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) mammal regulation changes are before the California Fish and Game Commission (CFGC) now. A modification to Title 14 section 354 to allow lighted nocks while hunting was presented by the enforcement branch of CDFW to clarify language to benefit hunters. The CFGC will have final vote at their April meeting.

The California Legislature has reconvened to start the 2013 Legislation session. The end of February is the deadline to introduce new bills but keep in mind a legislator can “Gut and Amend” any bill at any time bypassing normal procedures.

## ISE SHOW RECAP

The International Sportsman's Exposition was at Cal Expo, Sacramento, on January 10- 13 this year. As I have for a lot of years, with a lot of very fine people, helping kids shoot bows & arrows. We had big changes this year, Bill Karr & Robin Wade from Western Outdoor News were no longer sponsoring the Youth Fair, so we were in transition. John Kirk, ISE Director, and Jenna Perry (of Wilderness Unlimited) were running the Youth Fair this year. I met John the Wednesday before the show (we had been Emailing) and met Jenna on Friday. BOTH did everything they could to help us, and make our time at the show successful. To avoid the problems we had during set up & breakdown last year, I spoke with Cal Expo parking, and things went much smoother this year. Robert Moore brought Maya's equipment out in a small trailer (which we left there) and were able to access it and load it up much faster Sunday (after the show closed). All in all, things went pretty good. On a personal note, I was dreading Search & Rescue being out there, because of the whistles they hand out to the kids (you try listening to THOUSANDS of them for three days!!!). I love their people, but didn't miss the whistles... It gets pretty loud in there, it's suppose to as it is filled with kids having fun!!

Now, as I have said many times, NONE of this is possible without all the folks that come out to volunteer their time, money, and expertise for the kids. My own club, Maya, had a bunch of our members out there. Yahi & Lodi show up every year, with Lodi always helping us tear everything down, and getting out of there. Yolo, El Dorado Hills, and Nevada County Sportsman all played a vital part in making this event successful. I must say that my Wilderness JOAD's couldn't be there this year as they were shooting in their own tourney, I hope you did well, I missed you and your folks... My good friend IBEP State Chairman John Waddles was there all three days with me, IBEP Joe Becker (who started this when the show was in San Mateo) and Dick Vermillion (both past IBEP State Chairs) came down from Paradise to help set up and man the booth. Wilderness Archery provided anything we needed, Trico Welding in Woodland sent a tank of gas for filling balloons, and Sacramento Balloons had mine waiting for me as I walked in to buy them. Maya, Nor-Cal, Cougar Mountain, Paradise, and Lodi all sent money to help out.

I had a very special couple I wanted to talk about. Back in December I got a call from a gentleman named Leroy Campbell. He had read my article in the CBH newsletter, and wanted to know more. We had a great conversation about the show and archery in general. Leroy wanted to make a contribution, so I gave him the details on how to do this. I then got a letter and a check for **\$500.00** from Leroy... He described himself as an "archery nut". I was floored. I then got a call from Leroy telling me that he and his wife Chloe would be up to help at the show... Now Leroy is 74 years young, rides a power scooter, he and his lovely wife are great! I got them passes for the whole show, and am already thinking of ways to make it easier for him to get around our booth (space is tight). If you ever get the privilege of meeting them, take the time to enjoy them.

Since this was a transition year for ISE, and donations are down, there was no raffle for the kids this year. Many of the parents and kids were disappointed in this, so that left me with a lot of left over money. I discussed this with Maya's & Nor-Cal's Presidents, as to what to do. We decided that I would open an account for the Youth Fair, and save it for next year. If ISE doesn't have a raffle, we will rig up something at the booth. As it was, I spent over \$100.00 for balloons, and put over \$120.00 in said balloons for the three days we are there. We had almost 1600 kids shoot at the booth during those three days, not counting a lot of parents & grandparents that I guilted into shooting. We also had a shoot off. D' Arci (an alternate for London Olympics) and Captain Roy Griffith (oversees DFG Hunter Ed Program). Her equipment is much more sophisticated than what the kids (or Roy for that matter) shoot, the kids LOVE seeing Roy shooting wearing his uniform, Sam Browne belt and gun. Great role models for both the boys and girls!! She smoked him, breaking 9 balloons to his two... Great fun! Many thanks to all the people, businesses, clubs, and ISE for making all this possible. It is a privilege and honor to work with ALL of you!! See you next year!!

My wife and I just returned from our first trip to Africa. We were on a Bowhunt at the Imbasa lodge just outside of Kimberley, South Africa. Mike our Host and his staff, treated us like royalty. The Imbasa lodge is a luxury facility with many amenities such as swimming pool, indoor sauna, Main dinning room, recreation room with a pool table, and living room with library, fireplace, and Satellite TV. All at Imbasa lodge did their best to make use feel welcomed. My PH, Evert and Tracker, Paul went out of their way to make my bowhunting experience one which I will remember for a long time to come. My wife Tatyana and I used their Sauna when we felt the desire to pamper ourselves. The daily food was always wonderful as we ate various game meat like kudu, wildebeest, etc. The kitchen was open 24/7 to whatever food and dessert we might want. I cannot say enough about our experience while staying at the Lodge.

Each morning upon wakening we were met with the sight and sounds of grazing game like springbok, sable antelope, red hartebeest, and more. We were in African heaven. My wife availed herself of opportunity to take trips to nearby game parks and early morning walks with Leon, one of the trackers at Imbasa.

The first day of bowhunting found me sitting in a blind about 1 or 2 mile from the lodge with my PH, Evert.

I was shooting a Fred Bear TD recurve at 65# that I short draw to about 59#. I make my own arrows with Easton 2212 aluminum shafts, 100 grain Magnus 2 blade BHs, and 3 Goose feather 5" fletching with Easton uni nocks. The arrows weight 480-500 grains.

My PH Evert and I sat in that blind from about 10am to some time before dusk and saw many different game come to water throughout the day. At one point a monkey (what species I do not know) came in to drink and just about made it to the water hole when it suddenly stopped and started screaming its head off. Must have sensed something was wrong but couldn't pinpoint our presence. It scrambled back to a tree branch and screamed its bloody head off for quite a while and scared off game after game that was attempting to come in. At one point I wanted to quiet it myself, but finally he scampered off leaving our blind in peace and tranquility.

I really thought that would end our hunt for the day. But since there was still quite a bit of daylight left and Evert had not seemed a bit disturbed about what had transpired, we sat it out.

Just around 4 or 5 pm game started to trickle back in as it had been a very hot day. Soon, Evert noticed a herd of Kudu he had seen earlier coming to water. I readied my bow, knocked an arrow and waited. One by one the kudu came in cautiously and deliberately, as most game does at waterholes. First were the female and young bulls. Then I saw a bull that had a wide set of horns, but not quite the full three curls of a mature adult. To my untrained eyes I thought this was a good enough trophy for this little trad bowhunter. But to my chagrin Evert said "don't shoot !!!" He then sat down at the back of the blind. I turned at that moment and asked, "why can't I shoot him?". "He's too young" is all Evert said. Then he told me there was another more mature bull yet to appear. As I turned back to peer thru the slit cut in the camouflage netting, the bull stepped into view and peered right into the blind.

Well I can tell you what a thrill it was to see his magnificent spiraling horns as he slowly started to approach the water broadside. Just behind him though, was a cow Kudu. Evert said "wait till she moves out of the way before you shoot in case of a pass thru". As soon as he ended that statement, the cow stepped out from behind the bull. That left me a clear shot with plenty of room behind.

I waited till the bull turned his head away from the blind then drew, anchored, and loosed a perfect arrow into the center pocket of the kill zone. All hell broke loose as the herd scattered back from whence they came, my bull in hot pursuit. I could see the arrow embedded deep into his vitals as he ran out of sight. Evert watched thru his binoculars as they ran out onto the savanna. He watched them for a while longer as I tried to compose myself and contain my emotions. "He's down" Evert said, bringing me back to some sort of normalcy.

We exited the blind and headed in the direction of the downed Kudu. He was magnificent, a dream come true for me as he was one of the main reasons for my trip. We found the back half of my arrow some 100 yds. from the blind, broken in half and covered with blood. The bull had a mark on his shoulder where the hair was recently missing. Evert said that was because the bull ran into a tree shortly before he fell, at about 200 yds. We just smiled and admired this magnificent trophy.

Evert called back to camp for the trackers and skinners. My wife was back in camp and she came in too. After dressing out the bull and taking pictures, we loaded my trophy onto Evert's pickup and drove back to the Lodge.

What an experience, and on the very first day. Well, my nerves were still reeling as Peter, our server, poured me a nice ice cold MGD with ice and a lemon. ( I am kind of funny that way, ice and a lemon with my beer)

We all sat around the campfire relishing in the experience and enjoying what had transpired. The fire was lit and the grill prepared for our first African BBQ of kudu steak as the sun set on our day. WOW this is bowhunting Heaven.
