

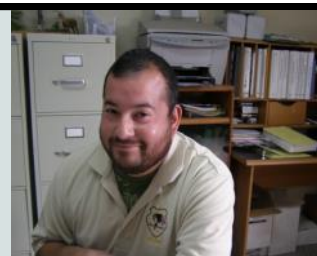

For the past eleven years I have been fortunate enough traveled back home to Kansas to hunt the rut, which historically lands around the second week of November. My family owns a farm in North Central Kansas along a river and that's where my dad, brother, and I hunt every fall. We strictly manage our ground around archery deer hunting. The crop this year on our two river-bottom fields was soybeans. It wasn't the best year for beans due to torrential rain in the spring, this allowed the weeds to germinate faster than the beans. Usually, we leave a strip or couple rows of crops along the edge near our treestands, but we didn't believe it was worth it this year. Instead, an alfalfa with clover food plot was drilled in one area which we traditionally left as tall grass.

This year, we also had unseasonably warm temps reaching the high 60's and low 70's during the day in November. With the temperature so high and lack of a hard freeze, the biting nats were still making late morning and early evening sits a little uncomfortable. My first four hunts, which included two evenings and two morning sits yielded little to be excited about. When we were out of the tree we constantly went through all the trail camera photos we pulled the days, weeks, and months before, but we still didn't have any monster bucks showing up. We run anywhere from 6-10 cameras on our farm at any point in time, none seemed to catch any giants. To give you an idea of what a Kansas giant is - two years ago we had multiple photos of a 196" buck that was shot during rifle season... across the

road from our ground. Makes me sick to think about, but that's hunting. Every year we normally have pictures of 160-175" deer, but this year seemed to be the exception. Nothing had shown up yet on camera.

On Tuesday, November 10, 2015, I will flipping through camera photos on my phone which were taken about 80 yards from the stand I was currently sitting in. It was around 4:00 PM, sunny, and nothing to keep my attention except swatting a few nats that landed. I was sitting in a ladder stand leaned up against a giant old cottonwood tree. With a south wind, I was banking on the deer walking the trail just south of my stand which was ten yards away. The tree was located off the north side of a timbered flat-stretch which was a pinch point between the river (to my north and east), our crop field (north and west), and a large, steep hill (south) covered with cedar trees where the deer bedded during the day. The field is about 35 yards to the edge and the hill to the south is about 25. If anything walks by the stand, it's an easy shot. The stand is in a prime location, but you have to get in quietly and early. I was settled in by 2:45 for the evening sit, so at 4:00 my phone was out and I passed the time by going through photos, which I'm sure I had viewed a 100 times already. Around 4:15 the familiar sound of a crunching leaves quickly got my attention from my phone to the timbered hillside just to my south and east. After a few seconds I picked out three does making their way down the steep hill into the flat timber area I was hunting. It took the does about 30 minutes to make their way from 70 yards, to 10 yards away. The does walked along the trail to my south between the hill and my stand. At 4:45 the does started staring past my stand and into the thick scraggly trees which have grown up on the edge of our field and the river. Without spooking I slowly turned around to see a tall white rack of a nice buck. Now focusing my attention to the buck I watch him slowly make his way onto the field edge and work a scrape. At this point I started to get worried because he will walk directly north of me at about 30 yards... directly downwind. Thankfully I hosed myself down about an hour before with a scent free spray, now it was time to put it to the test.

After what felt like an hour, which was probably ten minutes he made his way down the field edge and past my stand - without any indication he smelled anything. Once past my stand, I grunted at him with my grunt call. It stopped him in his tracks - but it also had a detrimental side effect. The does pinpointed me and started snorting. One doe in particular wouldn't quit. She snorted every thirty seconds which made me believe he would disappear back into the brush along the river. I silently sat there thinking "crap, this guy is about to take off." But, luck was on my side, instead of turning tail and giving me the white flag of retreat, he turned and walked directly towards the does. The rut was on! He focused in on the does and the 'buck' that just grunted a challenge to him. He crossed a small ditch that separated the timber from the bean field and stopped 25 yards away. He rubbed a tree and stood in a really thick mess of vine, fallen tree limbs, and old dead drift wood. At this point the does, one still snorting, wandered off to the south and west up a draw away from the field. Buck fever started to kick in while I waited, with bow in hand, for the buck to make his next move. It was only after the does were out of sight did I raise my binoculars to get a good look at him. He was a nice, tall G2 and G3 main-framed typical eight point. I decided that since the weather was warm and not seeing much the past two days of hunting that I would shoot him if he stepped into a shooting lane. At 5:10 he walked out of thick brush into my first available shooting lane. Twelve yards away. I drew back my bow and let the arrow fly. I watch the lighted green nock bury deep behind his left shoulder blade. He jumped and mule kicked into the air and took off. About ten yards from the shot I watched the arrow fall out on the opposite side of penetration. Ten yards from that... he tried to run directly up the side of the steep hill to my south. The buck made it about five yards up the hill and back flipped back down. He didn't get up again, he made it twenty five yards from where I shot him. Though he fell within eyesight, I still gave him twenty minutes while I sat back down with the shakes. My hands trembled from the buck fever as I texted my dad and brother that I shot a nice, old, mature eight point. It wasn't until I put hands on that I saw the kicker off his right G2. My 2015 Kansas buck tag was filled with an old mature nine pointer!

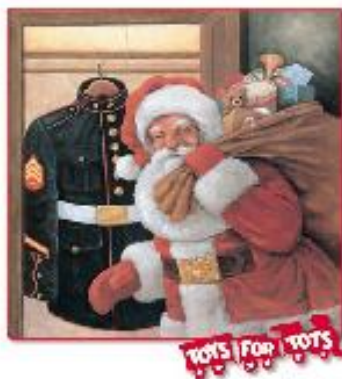

What is Nor Cal? The full name for this regional group is Nor Cal Bowhunters. They represent the areas 9 archery/bowhunting clubs and 3 archery pro shops to California Bowmen Hunters State Archery Association (CBHSAA). CBHSAA and Nor Cal are chartered to the National Field Archery Association (NFAA). What do Nor Cal and CBHSAA do for Archery or Bowhunting? There are many facets to their representation of Archery and Bowhunting. CBHSAA is “Dedicated to Promoting and Protecting the Archery and Bowhunting Heritages”. This statewide organization speaks for California Archers and Bowhunters in matters concerning Legislation and Regulation since 1943. The Legislative committee of CBHSAA includes a Coordinator, 6 state area reps and each region group has one legislative representative. Archery is a shooting sport so at times issues arise to limit or exclude the shooting of Bows and Arrows for any purpose. CBHSAA will pursue those actions for the benefit of all Archers and Bowhunters.

The next Nor Cal meeting will be Wednesday January 13<sup>th</sup> at Maya’s clubhouse. The meeting will cover the presented petitions from the National Field Archery Association (NFAA) and California

Bowmen Hunters State Archery Association (CBHSAA). There is one CBHSAA petition in regards to how many committee members the VP of Hunting can have. It’s an off year for NFAA petitions. NFAA and CBHSAA members will vote on the one petition at the Maya General meeting January 5<sup>th</sup>.

The next California Fish and Game Commission meeting (CFGC) will be December 9 & 10 in San Diego. Agenda items of interest include 17. Request for authorization to publish notice of intent to amend Commission meeting procedures regulations (Section 665, Title 14, CCR) 3 18. Approve Commission Conflict of Interest Code pursuant to the requirements of the Political Reform Act, 30. Adopt proposed changes to endangered or threatened animals regulations to add gray wolf (*Canis lupus*) to the list of endangered species (Section 670.5, Title 14, CCR), 36. Request for authorization to publish notice of intent to amend mammal hunting regulations (Sections 265, et al., Title 14, CCR) 37. Request for authorization to publish notice of intent to amend waterfowl hunting regulations (Sections 502 and 507, Title 14, CCR) 38. Discuss and act on future Commission meeting items (A) Next meeting – February 10-11, 2016, in Sacramento (B) Rulemaking calendar updates (C) New business (D) Other.

Deer hunters not able to fill their deer tags will need to report the unsuccessful tag to DFW. Report options include, online, snail mail or drop off at DFW offices. Failure to report will result in a \$20 penalty assessed when purchasing your next hunting license.

### Community:

The next Maidu All Skills Archery Classes will be Saturday December 19<sup>th</sup> and January 9<sup>th</sup>, 10am to 12pm. Classes are held at the site in range far right side. During these classes the site in range is still open except for the wall of hay and sometimes the 20 yard target for extra-large groups. Thanks to all the members who have used the site in range while the classes have been held to keep safety as a priority.

The Sacramento Sportsmen Expo will be January 21<sup>st</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup> at Cal Expo. The Youth Fair portion of the Sportsmen Expo will be the evening of January 22<sup>nd</sup> to 24<sup>th</sup>. Nor-Cal region clubs will be manning the archery range during the event. Carlos will be organizing Maya’s time at the fair. . If interested in assisting on the range, contact him.
